Safe & Caring...Everyone Matters

There are a multitude of opportunities that arise throughout the year where we engage students in conversations and actions that expand their understanding of different perspectives, capitalizing on the idea that everyone matters. A few examples from the past month include our participation in the Terry Fox run, and Orange Shirt Day, whose theme is "Every Child Matters", and is an integral part of National Truth and Reconciliation Day on September 30. Many powerful conversations happened and continue to happen, in classrooms around this idea.

From a global perspective the importance of our First Responders has become very pertinent due to events over the last few years. At the school level we consider parents our line of First Responders that we connect with for everything from a "whoops" on the playground to an emerging illness. We have always appreciated the ability to work together with families to ensure the safety and wellness of our whole school community. To continue to help us in this regard, can we ask that you please:

- Contact the office if your demographic information changes (e.g. telephone number/ emergency contact list and so on)
- Keep your child home if they are ill
- Contact the office if your child is going to be absent
- Continue to work within the <u>RVS Safe & Secure</u> parameters
- Help your child understand and adhere to the general rules & routines of school

As always, I am open to your questions, concerns, and conversations about your kids. On that note at the recent School Council meeting there was an excellent conversation around the "Hands On/Off" processes at school. To sum up the general feedback at the meeting, there was recognition that there is a time and place for more "hands on" and that for the most part it is not at school, in the same way that it would not be expected behavior in most work environments. There was also discussion about the idea of "consent" as well. Below is the excerpt from the RVS Rules & Routines insert in September's School Newsletter, to further explain the intent behind this guideline:

Hands On/Off

*Hands off is generally the best rule...but sometimes with consent a "handshake, high 5, or hug" are good ways to physically connect. These options are often coached in primary grades. As we move into Middle School the idea of consent can be trickier to navigate, as often students are not comfortable with a hug etc. from peers but are not confident enough to say so. We have seen an increased desire for many students to connect physically at this age, but also discomfort for others. Hugs between some for example have become extra long, hands here & there and so on. It can become a very 'gray' area to navigate. So...at this time we are asking that in Middle School in particular we respect one another's boundaries through generally a "hands off" approach. High 5s & elaborate handshakes - A- Okay, but no hugs, hand holding and so on. As we move further into the year we may be able to re-negotiate this, particularly after some consent teaching and a gauge on the level of maturity and confidence we are seeing amongst students.

*Play fighting is a No - 80%+ of the time this ends up in a real fight

*Deliberate physical aggression/ fighting has significant consequences

Feel free to call the office to connect at any time about anything that has you wondering or worrying. We look forward to continuing to partner with you to support your child's success this year!


If you require a paper copy, please let your child's teacher know.



Parent Awareness Letter

Dear Parent or Guardian:

When children return to school an old problem returns. Gathering all those little people into close contact provides ideal conditions for the spread of head lice.

Please take a few minutes now to check your child for head lice and to talk to your children about how to avoid becoming an unwilling host to an unwelcome insect.

Head lice are small, grayish or brown insects that live and breed in human hair. They cannot fly or jump, but can move very quickly from one head to another during direct head to head contact. Lice move freely on the shaft of hair but cling so tightly that brushing, combing, and washing with regular shampoo will not remove them. Adult lice lay eggs, called nits, on the shaft of the hair. A nit is small, oval shaped, grayish white in color and firmly cemented to the hair. Adult lice may bite the scalp which causes intense itching.

To detect head lice carefully examine hair close to the scalp, pay attention to the back of the head close to the neck and behind the ears. Look for any nits; adult lice will be difficult to see as they move quickly and avoid light. When examining the scalp, care needs to be taken to determine the difference between dandruff and the presence of nits.

If your child has lice contact HEALTHLink Alberta toll-free 1-866-408-LINK (5465) or your local pharmacist for information on treatment. Contact families with whom your child has had close contact. Remember, if lice have already spread from your child to his/her friend, your child can be reinfested after treatment.

Tips to pass on to your children:

- Don't share personal grooming items (brushes, combs, hair barrettes,)
- Don't share towels, headphones, sleeping bags, hats, scarves, pillows and stuffed animals.
- Use your own hangers at school. Clothes which are piled preserve warmth, so lice can move freely in the pile.
- Children with long hair should consider tying or braiding it, especially if an incidence of lice is occurring in their school.

Routinely check your school children for head lice every two weeks during the school term. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to call your public health nurse for more information.
